My Voting Plan

Am I registered to vote?

- Check myvote.wi.gov/
- Confirm your voting address and name are current. If not, you may update them online.

I need to register to vote – what are my options?

- **Online** at myvote.wi.gov/. Up to 20 days before Election Day. Requires a valid State of Wisconsin Driver License or State of Wisconsin ID card issued by the DMV.
- **Mail**. Up to 20 days before Election Day. Mail completed form to your municipal clerk.
- **In person** at your municipal clerk's office during the clerk's business hours. You must provide proof of residence. Deadline: 5 PM on Friday before election. [Find your Clerk.](#)
- **At your polling place** on Election Day. Must provide proof of residence and a Photo ID.

How do I request an absentee ballot?

- You may apply for your absentee ballot in-person in your clerk's office or the request can be made in writing by mail or online at myvote.wi.gov/en-us/VoteAbsentee.
- Request your absentee ballot as soon as possible.

What is on my ballot?

- Go to www.myvote.com and click on "Check My Ballot." You will need your address.
- www.vote411.org can be a good resource to learn about the candidates and about candidates forums.

I need to vote in person. Where do I go to vote?

- You can vote early at your local clerk's office. This is also called "in-person absentee voting." If you need to register to vote, you may do so at this time. Contact your clerk for absentee voting hours and locations: [Find my Clerk](#) on MyVote Wisconsin.
- Voting on Election Day? Check your polling place before you go. It may have changed. Find your polling place at myvote.wi.gov/en-us/FindMyPollingPlace. Bring an acceptable photo ID for voting, such as a driver's license or State ID for voting.

My Polling place is not accessible. What should I do?

- If a you cannot enter the absentee voting location or polling place due to disability, Wisconsin law requires that curbside voting must be available. Contact your clerk in advance to ask about how to access curbside voting at your polling place.
- You could also request that your clerk look at other options in the future to provide an accessible voting place.
- You may also notify the Wisconsin Election Commission. Complaints may be entered online at elections.wi.gov/complaints; you may use the option to "Report an Accessibility Concern". Or call the Commission at 1-866-VOTE-WIS.
