



# Voting Flowchart: Eligibility, Registration, & Voter Photo ID

#### **Online Registration:**

- Up to 20 days before the election.
- If you have a valid State of Wis. Driver License or State of Wis. ID card issued by the Wis. Dept. of Motor Vehicles (DMV) you can register to vote online at myvote.wi.gov.
- To register online, enter your name, date of birth, Driver License or ID number, and an address that matches what is on file with the Wis. DMV. If all fields match, you will be able to register completely online and will not need to send a proof of residence document.
- If all of your information does not match the Wis. DMV information, you will be given the option to print, sign and mail the form (or deliver it to your municipal clerk), You must provide a Proof of Residence document when registering.

Note: A photo ID is **not** required when registering to vote but will be needed to vote by most voters. **See Voter Photo ID Flowchart** for more information.

#### By mail:

Yes

- Up to 20 days before the election.
- Registration forms should be mailed to your municipal clerk.

Registration options: Do you have a valid Wis. Driver License or State ID card?

- You can start you registration form online at <u>myvote.wi.gov</u>.
- Your form must be printed, signed, and mailed or delivered to your municipal clerk.
- You must provide a Proof of Residence document when registering.
- When registering by mail, you can use any of the forms of Proof of Residence except a residential lease.

#### **Municipal Clerk's office:**

- You may register inperson in your municipal clerk's office up until the Friday before the election at 5 p.m. or close of business, whichever is later.
- You must always provide a Proof of Residence document when registering to vote.

## Polling place:

- You may register at the polls on Election Day.
- You must always provide a Proof of Residence document when registering to vote.

### Proof of Residence documents include:

- A current and valid Wis. Driver License or State ID card
- A utility bill (must be for the period no earlier than 90 days before registration date
- An intake document from a residential care facility
- (i.e. nursing home or group home)

- Bank statement or credit card statement

# Voter Registration Flowchart



If you are **indefinitely confined**, you do **not have to provide a copy of a photo ID**, instead you may:

- Indicate on your absentee ballot application form that you are indefinitely confined due to age, illness, or disability
- Sign your absentee ballot envelope, and then have your absentee witness verify your identity by also signing your absentee ballot envelope before you return it.

If you live in a nursing home or residential care facility and do not have an acceptable photo ID, you may:

- Have the two Special Voting Deputies (SVDs) verify your identity by signing your absentee ballot envelope as witnesses, if your nursing home/facility is visited by SVDs.
- Ask an authorized representative of the facility to sign the absentee ballot envelope to verify your identity, if your facility is not visited by SVDs.

You must have a **photo ID to vote** (in person or absentee), unless you qualify for one of two exemptions. Are you: 1.) indefinitely confined, or 2.) living in a nursing home or residential care facility? Do you currently have an acceptable form of photo ID needed to vote?

Here's how you can get a free photo ID for voting:

Go to your local Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV) service center (find locations here: <u>https://wisconsindot.gov/Pag</u> <u>es/online-srvcs/find-dmv</u>

Bring your Social Security number and original documents that prove 1.) your name and date of birth; 2.) your identity; 3.) your Wisconsin residency; and 4.) your U.S. Citizenship.

If you don't have all/any of the documents needed, you can still get an ID for voting. Bring the documents you have to the DMV and complete the necessary forms to get a photo ID document by mail in time for voting.

Fill out a "Wisconsin Identification Card" application (available online and at the DMV) .
