

Am I Registered to Vote?

- Check at <u>www.myvote.wi.gov</u>.
- Confirm your voting address and mailing address are current (can update online).
- Options if you are not registered to vote:
 - <u>Online</u> at <u>myvote.wi.gov/</u> Requires Photo ID. (deadline Jan. 26 for February 15, still possible for April 5)
 - <u>Mail.</u> Up to 20 days before Election Day. Mail completed form to your municipal clerk. (deadline Jan. 26 for February 15, still possible for April 5)
 - In person, at the municipal clerk's office. Must provide proof of residence.
 - At your <u>polling place</u> on Election Day. Must provide proof of residence and photo ID.



Voting Absentee

- ▶ Request, complete, and return your ballot as soon as possible.
- There is no change in Wisconsin law for absentee ballot return for the Feb 15 election.
 - Voters have the option to ask a person of their choice to return their ballot.
 - Absentee ballot drop boxes may be used.

Indefinitely confined voter -

Will always need an absentee ballot due to age, illness, infirmity, or disability. You can make a single absentee ballot request to your local municipal clerk to vote an absentee ballot automatically at each election. You will have your ballot mailed to you for each election until you don't return a ballot.

Note: Any voter may request absentee ballots for the year.

What are Wisconsin's Photo ID requirements for voting?

Most Wisconsin voters must show an acceptable photo ID when voting at the polls on Election Day or by absentee ballot.

Key Rights as a voter with a disability

Right to vote privately and independently.

Right to access the polling place.

Right to use the accessible voting machine at your polling place.

Right to ask for accommodations, such as a chair to sit in rather than standing in line, signature guide, magnifying glass, assistance stating your name and address.

Rightto assistance marking your ballot (just not
your employer or your union representative)



Key Rights as a voter with a disability

Right to Curbside voting if you cannot go into your polling place as the result of a disability

Right to bring a "notes sheet" into the polling place

Right to request another ballot if you make a mistake

Right to file a complaint if you feel your rights have been violated

Rightto vote as you wish.NO ONE SHOULD TELL YOU HOW TO VOTE!

State Legislators
